

Champion Rider

Congratulations to one of our members. Patricia Peverill and her trusty mule Georgette has been competing in the California State Horseman Association Trail Trials throughout California. CSHA Trail Trial Program is a sanctioned program where riders are judged on their skills and abilities to guide their horse/mule through a natural course. All obstacles are those that might naturally occur on a trail. Each Trail Trial is a individual day with 10 to 12 obstacles covering a 4 to 8 mile trail. Most of the trails are in mountain type terrain. None of the obstacles are designed to scare your animal. Each obstacle has a judge that is looking at your ability to maneuver the obstacle in a safe and correct manner. Not only is your ability being judged but also the ability of your mount. Everyone enters an obstacle with a zero and loses points for your or your mounts mistakes. A typical trail course the maximum points one can lose is between 240 to 250 points on a 10 obstacle course. You must participate in at lease three trail trial events and work an event in order to be invited to the State Championship.

Patricia and Georgette participated in 10 trail trial events. In Region 4 the region that she belongs to she received the lowest points of any other members in Region 4 in her division. Patricia was awarded the Supreme Champion Horse /Mule Blanket and a First Place Buckle. Being invited to go to the State Championship which was held at the Santa Cruz Equestrian Center just outside of Henry Cowell State Park. This event was 2 days of riding trails and competing in 20 obstacles. The state judges are tough. The course was very stressful for both Patricia and Georgette but with the stick to it attitude, they as a great team were awarded the first place buckle in her divisions. It was a long ,stressful and a hard working year.

Now that they placed First in their division they have to move up to the next division. I know they are looking forward to another great year. If you have any questions about the trail trials and think you might be interested in competing please contact Patricia.



Places to stay with your horse: Winter Time

Carrizo Plain National Monument, Santa Margarita California Cost: Free

Dry Camping is allowed in the Carrizo Plain National Monument. However, for those who require corrals and other amenities, you can stay at KCL Campground or Selby Horse Camp. Both are free and have corrals. Both campsites have water spigots that are usually on. From the BLM Website: Dry Camping is permitted in the foothills and mountainous areas. It is NOT permitted on the valley floor area to protect sensitive biological resources and to prevent obstruction of scenic vistas, nor is it permitted at Soda Lake and adjacent areas. There are established dry camping areas around the monument, please look for these and do not make new ones. Remember to always practice Leave No Trace.

From the BLM Website: Equestrian use is permitted on the Carrizo Plain. Trailer parking is available, but limited to already impacted areas such as campgrounds and parking areas. Equestrians are prohibited on most walking trails, including but not limited to Painted Rock, Wallace Creek, Soda Lake Boardwalk, and Overlook Hill. Portions of some walking trails are used for equestrians as allowed and signed, such as the Caliente Ridge Trailhead and the Caliente Mountain Trail.

Amateur/Ham Radio

At our General Meeting on January 17 we had the opportunity to listen to **Greg Waters** discuss the use of Amateur/Ham Radio. The presentation started with a video on how the Ham Radio Operators play a huge part in emergency service. When other communications fail, the operators are ready to assist. The main focus on the presentation was how to get the license and the use of the radio. Being a licensed amateur/ham radio operator can give you a feeling of security when riding in the back country. Usually when other forms of communications are unavailable the ham radio can get you in contact with the outside world. Since many of the operators are familiar with the local area they can assist in getting you quicker service when needed.

As shown above Greg offers free classes but there is a charge for taking the test. There are many links on the internet that can help you out in preparing for the test. Since the price of hand held radios have dropped it is fairly inexpensive to get started in this hobby. We really appreciate Greg's giving us his time to do this presentation. Here is some information about Greg. Greg Waters, KJ6OUI, has been an amateur extra class since 2014 and resides in Fresno, California. He is currently employed at BICC of California as a behavior analyst. Greg has been serving as a public information officer for San Joaquin Valley region since 2013 and he is also an active member of Fresno County Emcomm ARES/RACES since 2011. Prior to his lead instructor appointment, class sizes ranged from 3 to 5 students and after Greg was voted in as lead coordinator in August of 2015 his first class had over thirty students attend and pass the technician class license exam.

Greg is active participant in the off road community and belongs to Clovis Independent 4 Wheelers and 4x4Him and promotes the use of amateur radio use in the off road community and mutual aid between the two hobbies.





Objectives & Purpose of the Backcountry Horseman of California From the BCHC Bylaws

- To improve and promote the use, care and development of California backcountry trails, campsites, streams and meadows; to advocate good trail manners.
- To promote the conservation and utilization of our backcountry resources in concert with livestock transportation.
- To keep the backcountry trails and forage areas open to horseman on all public lands.
- To keep current information before the Corporation membership and its local Units regarding new legislation or management plans related to government regulations of the backcountry.
- To support or oppose new proposals, plans and restrictions as related to the interest of horsemen and those persons interested in recreational stock use and enjoying the backcountry.
- To promote the interest of people who, due to health or physical factors, need transportation other than by foot on backcountry trails.
- To promote public awareness and interest in the historical aspect of horsemen and stock in the backcountry and to help educate backcountry users on the ways to use the trail and foraged in a manner that conserves the backcountry resources.
- To assist in keeping the public informed of the vital need for a clean backcountry.
- To promote a working relationship with and keep the work and interests of the Corporation before our local, state and federal officials.
- To assist in the formation and continuation of local Units to carry out these purposes.
