

CHEESEBURGER PASTA

It's a cheesy pasta made in a skillet that has all of your favorite ingredients mixed in to a delectable sauce, topped and topped with melty cheese. It's what camping pasta dinner dreams are made of!

INGREDIENTS:

- 1-1/2 cups uncooked whole wheat penne pasta
- 3/4 pound lean ground beef (90% lean)
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 can (14-1/2 ounces) no-salt-added diced tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons dill pickle relish

- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 2 tablespoons ketchup
- 1 teaspoon steak seasoning
- 1/4 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 3/4 cup shredded reduced-fat cheddar cheese
- Chopped green onions, optional



INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Cook pasta according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Drain pasta; add to meat mixture. Advertisement

2. Stir in the tomatoes, relish, mustard, ketchup, steak seasoning and seasoned salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 5 minutes.

3. Sprinkle with cheese. Remove from the heat; cover and let stand until cheese is melted. Garnish with green onions if desired.

DESERT RIDE AT STARLIGHT RANCH NW OF ROSAMOND CA



March 20-23, 2025

We normally go into town (Rosamond 1/2 hr away) Friday night for dinner at our favorite Mexican restaurant. There is an Albertsons, convenience stores and gas stations there. A Breakfast to be provided at 9:00am Saturday and Sunday. Potluck Dinner Saturday, we will provide pulled pork or deep pit beef. We need **<u>RSVP by March 13th.</u>** Need to bring water for you and your horse and anything else they want to drink. Some beds available but need to secure with us. Bed rolls tents and whatever is needed for general camping. Terrain is simple to difficult depending on trail with all trails being packed to loose desert soils that are easy on the hoofs. Coyotes and Jack rabbits mice and desert rats for local animals. There are snakes but I have never seen one and we have done a lot of cross country out there. Most of the trails/roads are a gradual climb but depends on what you want to do. There is one that goes up to the PCT but would be a long ride. Clean up needs to be done behind horses and distribute outside fence. Take out all other that you bring in. There is a outhouse on the property and a flush toilet in the house. May want to bring your own toiletries to be safe.

The gate at the ranch will be open at noon on the 20th and property will be cleared and gate closed by 2pm Sunday the 23rd. Any wood you may have for the fire would be helpful. **Directions:** Starlight Ranch is already tagged on google maps if you use that. The map shows traveling on what is called Aqueduct RD but you want to go 30' further on Backus Rd. to what we call Upper Aqueduct RD where you will see a large Rock painted with a Smiley Face. Although the lower road can be used to get there, there are more obstacles and a large dip that larger trailers may have issues with.

Take CA Hwy 99 south to CA Hwy 58 East out of Bakersfield to Tehachapi about 43 miles. Exit at Tehachapi Blvd and go Right on Tehachapi Blvd. Loves Truck Stop will be on your Right. Continue on Tehachapi Blvd for 1 mile and go Right on Willow Springs Road and follow for 16.0 miles where you will turn Right on Backus RD. Backus RD is paved for about 1.2 miles When you come to the end of the pavement you will see a dirt road to the right that you will proceed on. The rest of the trip is on dirt roads. You will continue on Dirt Backus RD over a short bridge and on to Upper Aqueduct RD. You will see a large rock painted with a Smiley Face. Turn left and continue on Upper Aqueduct RD for 3.6 miles to 140th St. There will be a curved dirt road leading to the right onto 140th St and most will want to take that. You will see a sign on your left that says Starlight Ranch. Go left before the sign and drive straight back about 100 feet and through the gate to the ranch. You will need to bring water for overnight stays. The ranch is cyclone fenced but horses/stock will need to be tied up. There are just 3-4 highline areas first come first serve. There are some bed opportunities in the house and out buildings on the property but please call to claim. Jim and Doug Laber will be hosting the ride at the Starlight Ranch which is owned by Family. We will have a generator there that gives us lights in the house in the evenings. There is a large patio and fire pit for gatherings. Firewood if you have it will help and we will be bringing some out with us. It can get very cold and or very windy at the ranch so be prepared for that. Hope to see you there!

Widening Wuh-ki'o

February 21, 2025 By Marcee Hansen



"Heading downstream from the footbridge, the Wuh-ki'o, winds through four miles of oak and pine woodlands on the northern side of the river. Wuh-ki'o is the Dumna/Kechayi tribal name for the San Joaquin River. Along the trail, one encounters spectacular views of the river gorge, the table mountains, and surrounding oak woodlands." -BLM

The Wuh-ki'o Trail at the San Joaquin River Gorge is one of three trails which is used by Equestrians, Mountain Bikers, and Hikers. Although this trail ends on Millerton Lake State Recreation Area 9 miles from the start, only about 3 miles from the Pas'an Trail takes you to the boundary of BLM. It is an "Out & Back" ride that nears 10 miles from the trailhead and back to the trailer. The Wuh-ki'o tends to be the least traveled and the last on the priority list for most of the volunteer trail work groups. So BCHC-SJSU decided to get busy.

Our recon ride took place on January 11th. Doug Laber, Jim Laber, new member Christee Hansen and I met at the Equestrian Camp at 9 am. We headed out after a quick discussion of our goals for the day. As we rode, we found the head clearance was not too bad. The work that would be required to clear the requested height and width would take two days maximum for the entire trail. The area of the trail that needs immediate attention is the narrow edge which overlooks the river. That part of the trail has been steep and solid for many years. Widening may take a full day, since it is on a sharp grade and about a tenth of a mile long. Yet, with many hands it could go very fast. Before we came to the narrow part of the trail, we met with 3 mountain bikers. We found a spot to let them by and exchanged a little conversation. They warned us about the narrow passing and some of the overhead growth. They were very happy to hear we were there to look at what needed to be accomplished for our multi-use trails to be safe and fun for all.

On Wednesday, February 12th, Lois Patten, Karen Daughrity, and I tacked and packed to get started on the trail by 11am. The first project was to start widening the trail where there is only about two feet of single track very close to the edge of the San Joaquin River. The trail is solid and has not changed for well over 10 years. Yet, there is always a chance. Right?! We took our tools and got to work. As Karen cleared areas of overgrowth, Lois started at the far end, widening part of the trail and cleared more brush farther up the trail. I started at the beginning. With help from Karen and Lois the section I started was extended to a width of 3 plus feet to approximately 15 yards. Not much, but it was a start. We called it a day after 2 hours and got back to the trailer at 5pm. Now to plan the next outing.

Our Work Party Weekend for the Gorge is set for May 2nd to the 4th . We will be camping at the Equestrian Camp. Corrals are limited. Yet, you are welcome to bring travel corrals, Highlines, Hyties, or tie to your trailer (only if this is something your equine is accustomed to). If you are interested in helping us succeed in keeping our trails safe and fun, please contact any of the members in our newsletter. Non-potable water is available. Restrooms have vault toilets and are available. Fires are welcome in firepits only, unless otherwise noted on the camp board.

Come enjoy friendships, ideas, trail kinship, and lots of laughs. And of course, meet new horses and mules.



















- To improve and promote the use, care and development of California backcountry trails, campsites, streams and meadows; to advocate good trail manners.
- To promote the conservation and utilization of our backcountry resources in concert with livestock transportation.
- To keep the backcountry trails and forage areas open to horseman on all public lands.
- To keep current information before the Corporation membership and its local Units regarding new legis-lation or management plans related to government regulations of the backcountry.
- To support or oppose new proposals, plans and restrictions as related to the interest of horsemen and those persons interested in recreational stock use and enjoying the backcountry.
