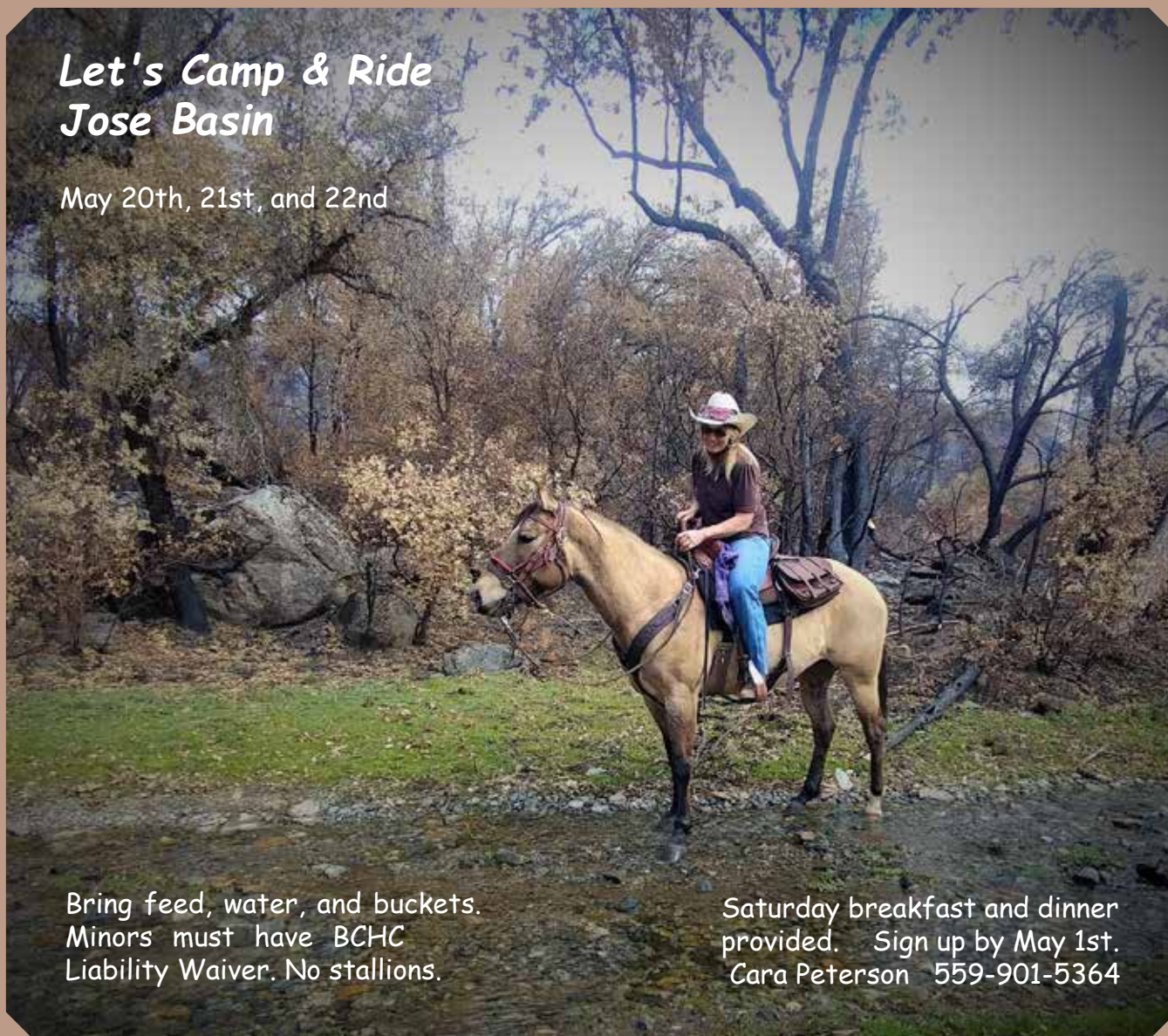

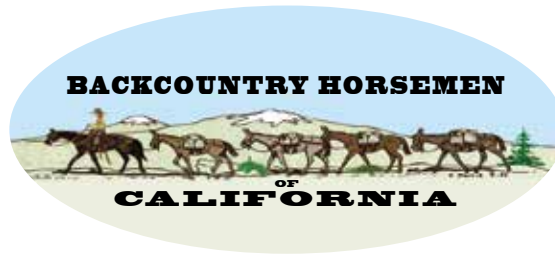

As we start a new year it is time to review BCHC San Joaquin Sierra Unit Rules on the Trail.

1. Trail discipline is essential to insure safety of all riders and mounts. The Trail Boss has absolute authority. All riders should position behind the Trail Boss and remain there during the ride unless he/she gives permission to do otherwise. If there are several groups, each group must have a designated leader and abide by the rules decided upon for that group.
2. The "Drag" and other ride assistants named by the Trail Boss, also have authority over the riders. All riders must remain in front of the Drag rider.
3. Always keep at least on horse length but not more
4. When the group has stopped, observe the horse length rule with regard to all horse about you.
5. When traveling on a road, all riders must ride on the same side of the road, especially when vehicles are passing.
6. Riding side by side is permissible, if the trail is wide enough, and all trail rules are observed.
7. If you must pass, ask the rider in front of you, come up slowly, and allow plenty of room.
8. When mounting to ride, keep your horse still until everyone is mounted.
9. Never tie up your horse with the reins.
10. Smoke in designated areas.
11. Watering holes: space your horses out for safety. After watering in a stream, wait on the other side, as some horses will not drink if the group is moving ahead.
12. Check your horse shoes and all tack within a week of going o a ride.
13. No person shall ride in a manner that might endanger any other person or mount.
14. Horses known to kick must wear a Red Ribbon on their tail-but remember- any horse can kick.

Ribbon Color Meanings

Red . Adding a literal "red flag" to your horse's tail is a useful method to warn others that your horse is known to kick. . Don't get too near the working end of a beast wearing red.

Green, is used to signify a lack of experience. Green ribbons are appropriate for not only young horses, but also those that have too few trail miles under their hooves.

Yellow, Yellow is also the cautionary color of the roadways. Stallions are often asked to wear ribbons of yellow

Blue is strong and steadfast. The color of freedom and open spaces is also sometimes used to let others know that you're riding a stallion.

White is pure and clean. Ribbons of white mean that the horse is for sale.

Pink is the delicate color of femininity, cotton candy, and mares in heat. Horses wearing pink may be cranky, easily distracted and a distraction to stallions in the area.

15. When riding beside a paved road, ride the dirt shoulder with the traffic.
16. Hauls your trash out from lunch stops and campsites.
17. "Take only pictures, Leave only hoof prints."
18. Never run your horses on trails.
19. Dogs are prohibited on trail,for safety riders. BCHC-SJSU Rules
20. No alcohol on trail.

BBQ Dutch Oven Chicken and Potatoes

If you are looking for the best camping food recipe, look no further! This BBQ Dutch Oven Chicken and Potatoes recipe couldn't be easier, and it will absolutely be a big hit on your next camping trip

INGREDIENTS:

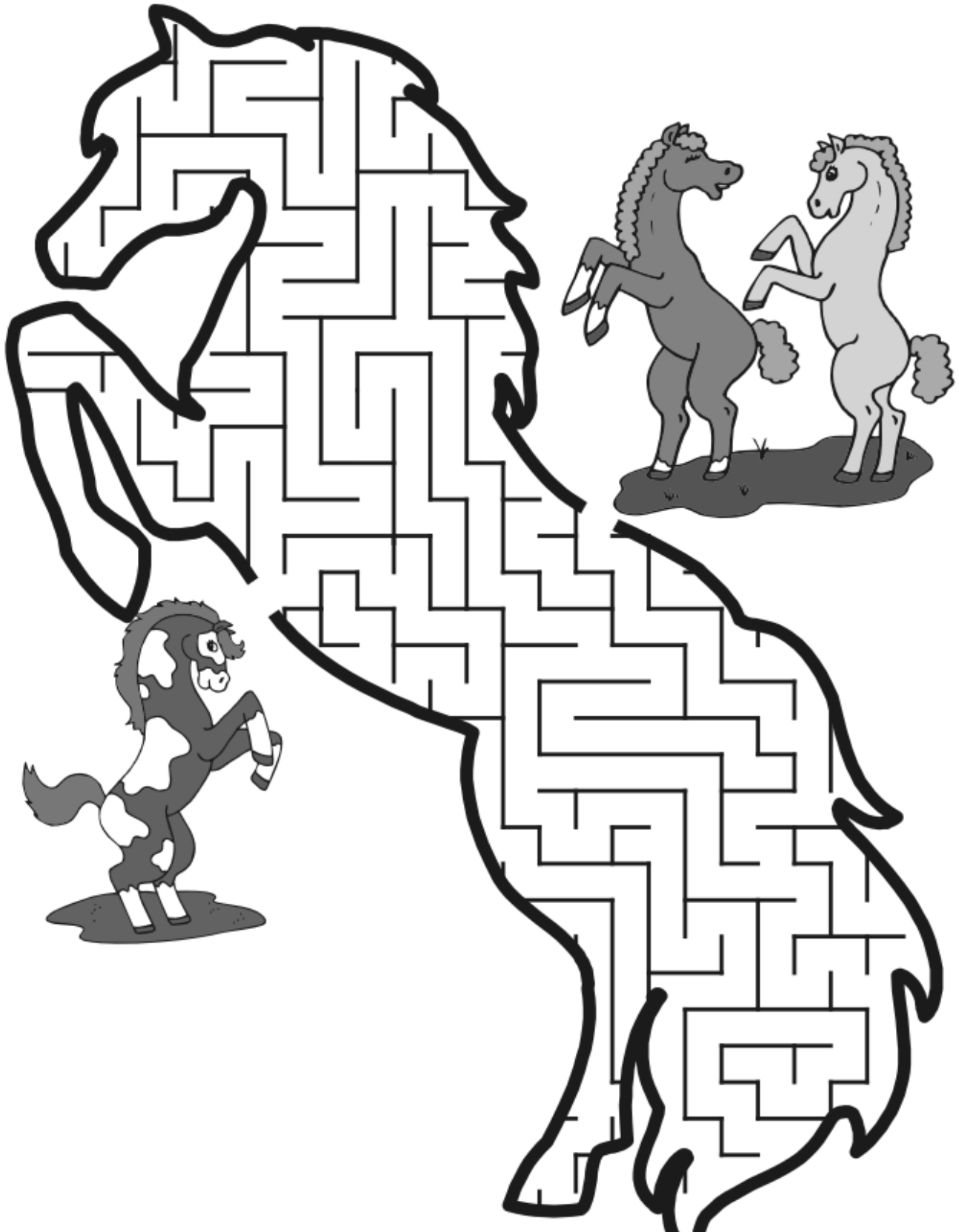
- 3-4 large chicken breasts
- 1 package of bacon
- 5 small potatoes, sliced into 1/4 – 1/2 inch slices
- 1 red onion, chopped
- 1 lb butter, optional
- 1 bottle of your favorite BBQ sauce
- 26 coals



INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Make sure your coals are burning nicely. Place dutch oven on top and put bacon in dutch oven.
2. Cook bacon until cooked. Drain most of the excess grease (you want to keep probably 1/4 cup in the dutch oven)
3. Add onions, potatoes, chicken breasts, onion, butter, and BBQ sauce into the dutch oven.
4. Cover with lid and make sure there are 14 coals underneath the the dutch oven and 12 on top.
5. Cook about 35-50 minutes, or until the chicken is done.

KIDS CORNER



THEY'RE HERE



No, I am not talking about Poltergeist. I am talking about Rattlesnakes. They can be almost anywhere. We should learn about these snakes and how to avoid being bitten when having fun in the outdoors. Below is some information that I got off the internet.

When in Snake Country.

What to Do and NOT to DO.

Rattlesnakes are not confined to rural areas. They have been found in urban areas, on riverbanks and lakeside parks and at golf courses. The following safety precautions can be taken to reduce the likelihood of an encounter with a rattlesnake.

- Be alert. Like all reptiles, rattlesnakes are sensitive to the ambient temperature and will adjust their behavior accordingly. After a cold or cool night, they will attempt to raise their body temperature by basking in the sun mid-morning. To prevent overheating during hot days of spring and summer, they will become more active at dawn, dusk or night.
- Wear sturdy boots and loose-fitting long pants. Never go barefoot or wear sandals when walking through brush, wild areas.
- Children or adults should not wear flip-flops while playing outdoors in snake country.
- When hiking, stick to well-used trails. Avoid tall grass, weeds and heavy underbrush where snakes may hide during the day.
- Do not step or put your hands where you cannot see. Step ON logs and rocks, never over them,

and be especially careful when climbing rocks or gathering firewood. Check out stumps or logs before sitting down, and shake out sleeping bags before use.

- Never grab “sticks” or “branches” while swimming in lakes and rivers. Rattlesnakes can swim.
- Be careful when stepping over doorsteps as well. Snakes like to crawl along the edge of buildings where they are protected on one side.
- Never hike alone. Always have someone with you who can assist in an emergency.
- Do not handle a freshly killed snake, as it can still inject venom.
- Teach children early to respect snakes and to leave them alone.
- Leash your dog when hiking in snake country. Dogs are at increased risk of being bitten due to holding their nose to the ground while investigating the outdoors. Ask your veterinarian about canine rattlesnake vaccines and what to do if your pet is bitten.

What to do in the event of a snake bite

Though uncommon, rattlesnake bites do occur, so have a plan in place for responding to any situation. Carry a cell phone, hike with a companion who can assist in an emergency and make sure that family or friends know where you are going and when you will be checking in. In the event of a bite:

- Stay calm but act quickly.
- Remove watches, rings, etc., which may constrict swelling.
- Transport the victim to the nearest medical facility.
- For more first aid information, please call the California Poison Control System at (800) 222-1222.

What you should NOT do after a rattlesnake bite

- DON'T apply a tourniquet.
- DON'T pack the bite area in ice.
- DON'T cut the wound .
- DON'T use your mouth to suck out the venom.
- DON'T let the victim drink alcohol.

It would be advisable for you to check out different websites and to some research on Rattlesnakes. Lets all have a great riding season and BE SAFE. Until next time. HAPPY TRAILS.

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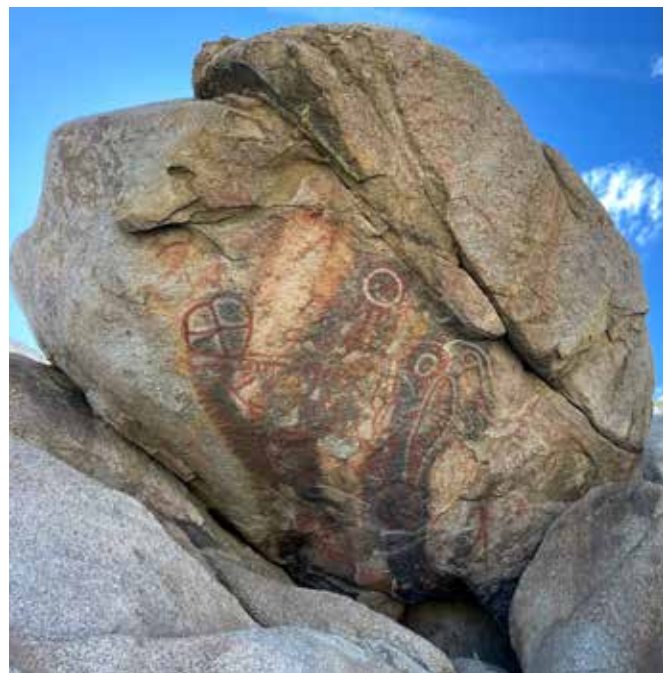

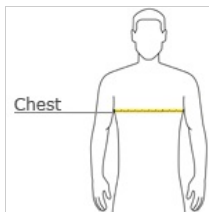

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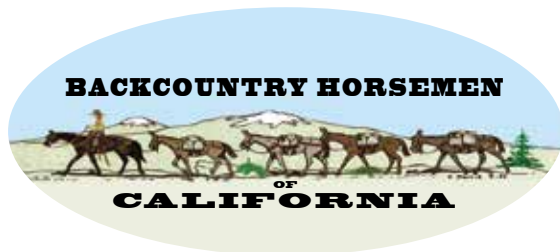

- To promote the interest of people who, due to health or physical factors, need transportation other than by foot on backcountry trails.
- To promote public awareness and interest in the historical aspect of horsemen and stock in the back-country and to help educate backcountry users on the ways to use the trail and foraged in a manner that conserves the backcountry resources.
- To assist in keeping the public informed of the vital need for a clean backcountry.
- To promote a working relationship with and keep the work and interests of the Corporation before our local, state and federal officials.
- To assist in the formation and continuation of local Units to carry out these purposes.
