# Let's Ride Local Upper Twin Lakes



Do you want a nice easy but very beautiful ride? Then do Upper Twin Lakes. To get to the trail head is about 85 miles from out of Fresno. The trail head is located above Huntington lake . You take the Kaiser Pass Road a few miles past Huntington Lake and park at the Badger Flat Trail head. Usually there is good parking if you get there early and no construction equipment is taking up the horse trailer parking area. It is an easy 4 mile ride into the lakes. You will enter the Kaiser Wilderness on your way to the lakes. You will pass the lower twin lake and then in a very short distance you will bridge the hill to see Upper Twin Lakes. This area is absolutely breath taking. If you are feeling really adventurous you can continue on around the lake and head up to George Lake. First part of that ride is not bad but right before the lake it can get kind of touchy. Again not for Novice Rider or Horse. Heading back to parking lot you can take the Sample Meadow Bypass but last week it had a lot of down trees that blocked the trail. Had to do a little four hoofing to get around and pick up trail. ### STUFFED BABY BELLS

This Easy Cheesy Stuffed Baby Bells Dutch Oven Campfire Appetizer is camping finger food at its finest!

### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 1/2 pound ground mild Italian sausage
- 2 cloves garlic chopped
- 1 small onion diced
- 8 oz. cream cheese softened

- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 12 mini bell peppers split in half lengthwise



### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. In cast iron skillet over medium heat, brown the Italian sausage.
- 2. Add garlic and onion, cook till softened.
- 3. Remove from heat and mix in cream cheese, cheddar cheese, salt and pepper.
- 4. Spoon cheese mixture in prepared peppers and place them in the bottom of a non-preheated 12-inch cast iron camp Dutch oven, then cover with lid.
- 5. Bake at approximately 350° until the stuffing is bubbly and peppers are softened.
- 6. Serve warm.

Directions:The camp is in Sequoia National Forest on the edge of Sequoia-Kings Canyon National Park (you have to enter the park to get here). From Fresno, CA, take highway 180 eastward to The Generals Highway (highway 198) and turn right onto General Highway go about 7 miles to forest road 14S11 and turn left. There is a Big Meadows sign there; road 14S11 is paved; the camp is about 4 miles up the road (camp coordinates are 36°43'01.76N 118°50'57.71W).

# TRIP TO BRYCE CANYON UTAH

**Part One** 



If you want a trip and horse/mule vacation of a lifetime, this is a must. It is a long trip from Fresno, California but well worth the time on the road. We left Fresno on May 9 and traveled our first leg of the trip to Las Vegas Nevada. This leg is a little over 8 hours. We laid over with our mules at Mary/Bryan Johnson's Ranch. It is located about 6 blocks off the 15 just behind the South Point Resort. It has easy access and the host are very helpful and nice people. Pens and lots of parking for your rig. The morning of the 10th we headed out on our last leg of the trip and arrived at Bryce Valley Ranch RV and Horse Park in Cannonville, Utah 6 hours later. All the roads are great and there are plenty of places to stop, eat and fuel up. This a great place to spend your time. We spent 11 days here and loved every minute. The host Sherry/Pete Jensen are very helpful. The camp has everything you would need. It is close to many trails and there are several right behind the camp and across the street. They have trailers to rent so you can hook up and head out to the trail heads. You can rent full day or half day depending on the ride you are going to take. You are 20 minutes from Bryce Canyon Nation park where you will find many things to do. You can do grocery shopping and get fuel just 7 minutes away in Tropic. There are also eating places there. For other needs you might have to travel to Panguitch which is 39 miles. This is a quaint little town with shops for feed, antiques, restaurants (no chains) one pharmacy and yes a Radio Shack. It has one grocery store that mostly everyone shops. Joes Main Street. If you go to

Bryce Canyon Utah area keep in mind that there are no local vets and farriers. They can be found but not an easy task. A group that traveled from San Diego had a horse colic and the vet had to travel 2.5 hours to get to camp and worked until midnight and then travel home. It was only a \$900.00 bill. When hauling your equine for great distance and have lay overs in strange place it is important to make sure your animal is drinking. The horse survived. The next morning after we arrived we took a short 7 mile ride behind the camp down the Paria River just to let the mules stretch their legs. If you like to partake in the spirits make sure you bring it with you. You can only buy hard liquor/ wine from the state stores between the hours of 1200 and 1800 hours. Beer you can get at stores and also right here in camp. Sherry /Pete are very fair on their prices in the store in camp. Be sure to check out their web page for information on their establishment. www. brycervandhorsepark.com Lots of information. The next articles will cover our individual rides. ### **CHAINS CHAINS**

OK people lets get it together. We always check our tack and make sure that we have all our equine needs. But lets not forget about the breakaway chains on our trailers. On our first ride at Cannonville Utah we were headed back to camp and we where about four miles out. As we came down the hill I turned and said to Pat." Look at that fire, Sure is a crazy day to have a control burn" As we rode in the direction towards the camp we noticed another fire in front of us. Winds are blowing around 15 mph and with greater gust. As we got to camp we noticed a larger fire burning on the edge of the RV Park where we were camped. This is crazy I thought to my self. As we put the mules away I looked towards the little town of Cannonville and there was a huge fire burning. By this time there were Sheriffs, Fire Trucks, and locals traveling up and down the road. We started to receive text from the camp host letting all of us know that they were aware of the fire and the camp was in no danger. But due to the Red Flag warning no campfires or fire pits were going to be allowed. As we found out later that evening there was a total of 14 fires set along the road side but all was under control. Guess what was the culprit that started all these fires. You got it.....someones breakaway chains were dragging on the pavement and started all these fires and the driver was clueless. So, lets check the chains each and every time we get underway with our trailers.



It was a beautiful, balmy 80 degrees at Shaver....a perfect day for a ride.








For that reason your unit board of directors has made this shirt availble for safety on trail rides and work parties as well as a way to promote our unit and its activities.







- To improve and promote the use, care and development of California backcountry trails, campsites, streams and meadows; to advocate good trail manners.
