

DUTCH OVEN BREAKFAST BAKE

A delicious dutch oven breakfast bake is the perfect recipe to serve the family for brunch.

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups Tatertot hash browns
- 1 Bell pepper, diced
- 1/2 White onion, diced
- 1/2 cup Cooked ham, diced

• 8 Eggs

- 1/2 cup Cheese, shredded
- 2 Green onion stalks, diced
- Salt & pepper



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Dice pepper, onion and ham.
- 2. Mix egg, cheese, salt & pepper.
- 3. Place ingredients into a large freezer bag for easy packing and storage. Tip: prepare the ingredients at home, in advance. This makes prepping and clean up a breeze when camping.
- 4. Line a dutch oven with parchment paper (this is optional but helps with clean up and serving later).
- 5. Layer tatertots on the bottom of the dutch oven.
- 6. Pour the egg mixture over the hash browns.
- 7. Place the lid on the dutch oven and bake for 60 minutes over the coals of a campfire or in an oven at 350 degrees.
- 8. Top with green onions before serving.

A Mountain Lion LUNCH?

A COMMON SENSE GUIDE TO UNDERSTANDING MOUNTAIN LIONS

Pumas are like a light breeze:
When one is present, you know it;
You can feel it, but you don't see it. John Seidensticker, 1991

The mountain lion, also known as puma, panther or cougar, is the largest carnivore (meat eater) of California. The generally secretive and solitary nature of lions makes it possible for humans to live in mountain lion country without ever seeing a mountain lion. The chance of being attacked is quite low compared to many other natural hazards. Attacks to humans are rare. A dozen people have been killed in the U.S. since 1890—though over half have occurred in the last fifteen years, indicating they are on the rise.

Generally, mountain lions are calm, quiet and elusive. They are usually found in areas that have adequate cover for ambushing and plentiful prey. These conditions exist in mountain subdivisions, urban fringes and open spaces, from deserts to coastal areas and to 10,000 foot elevations in the mountains. About half of California is prime mountain lion country!

The coloration of these lions is usually a tawny-yellowish but may also be a gray-brown to red-brown with black tipped ears and tail. The kittens, or cubs, are covered with blackish-brown spots and have dark rings around their tails. Adult males may be more than eight feet long from nose to end of tail and an average weight between 130 and 150 pounds. Adult females can be seven feet long and average between 65 and 90 pounds.

Think how quick, athletic and strong these animals are! They must be in excellent physical condition to survive. Lions are very powerful and normally prey upon large animals, such as deer, bighorn sheep and elk. However, they will prey on smaller animals as well, such as coyotes, skunks, raccoons and opossum. Domestic animals are also acceptable to their pallet, such as sheep, goats, cattle, horses, llamas, dogs, cats, ducks, and chickens. Mountain lions have excellent night vision and depth perception, prefer to stalk and ambush their prey, often from behind. The usual attack is with a powerful bite below the base of the skull, breaking the neck, or by suffocation. The carcass is often covered with dirt, leaves or snow and the lion comes back to feed on it over a course of a few days.

A lion's home range will often span over 100 square miles with many adults occupying the same area. Lion populations appear to be regulated not by social interactions but by the density of their principal prey. Competition for habitat is intense, especially in the western Sierra-Nevada where as many as 10 adult lions per 100 square miles has been recorded. The lion population has grown from an estimate of 600 in 1920 to a better field study of 2,000 in 1970. The 1990's show a population estimate ranging from 4,000 to 6,000.

Despite differences in opinions about mountain lions there is a common desire for proper scientific management of this magnificent animal. We must consider the regional diversity of the animals habitat, prey availability and human populations. Conflicts between mountain lions and humans vary regionally for different reasons. Minimizing your risk of becoming a mountain lion lunch is the main objective.

PACKING UP A TITLE

The Reedley College Mule Packing Team Wins Big at the Annual Mule Days Celebration in Bishop

It isn't often that a community college competes and wins against teams at the university level, but the Reedley College Mule Packing Team is the exception. The Tigers brought home the team packing championship at the annual Mule Days Celebration in Bishop, winning the hardware over Cal Poly, Fresno State, UC Davis and Modesto Junior College. There was also a combined team made up of students from Reedley College, Fresno State and Cal Poly. The Bulldogs and Mustangs also had two teams apiece, but not even that could stop the Tigers from bringing home the coveted buckle trophies. "What really paid off for our team is that they were very prepared," said first year Head Coach Loni Langdon. "All of the effort they put in really helped refine their skills."

Preparation paid off in the form of how dominant the team was. The Tigers were a minute faster than the other teams. "When we looked back after we crossed the finish line (after the first run), I couldn't believe how far ahead we were," said team member Cole Hansen.

It also helps to have cooperative animals as teammates. "Having the right stock for a competition like this is critical," said Langdon. "We have the best mules in the state for this. They're seasoned, calm under pressure and predictable. Their age and wisdom are huge assets." Maybe mules aren't so stubborn, after all.

"I was so excited to be sporting the same tiger orange shirt worn by this year's World Champion Collegiate Packer team," said teammate Laurel Machoian. "I could feel my school pride growing every time I saw the orange cross that dusty finish line first. There's no other program I'd rather have represented than our Reedley College team. I look forward to carrying on the packer and mulemanship traditions at Reedley."



Reedley College also won three individual competitions in Bishop: Harley McCorkle (Diamond Hitch), Cole Hansen (Box Hitch) and Jessie Miles (Packing). But the mules aren't used just for competitions; at Reedley College, they're helping develop students for job opportunities on some of the most beautiful lands on earth. "Packers and livestock who can help keep our trails open for recreation to people who visit from around the world is an essential service. It's a dying art," said Langdon, who also teaches the Mule Packing class on campus. "It makes what we're doing at Reedley College extremely important, and it's amazing to have such strong support from President (Jerry) Buckley to continue this work. Building a bridge between a community college and the National Forest Service is so unique."

When the Tigers return to Bishop next year to defend their title, they'll bring home lasting memories, regardless of the outcome. "It's not necessarily about the winning, but about experiencing an event of this magnitude and the impact it could make on our students," Langdon said. "You never know where this could take them. It's phenomenal."





For that reason your unit board of directors has made this shirt availble for safety on trail rides and work parties as well as a way to promote our unit and its activities.





Measure under the arm and around the fullest part of the chest with arms down, keeping tape


