

INGREDIENTS:

- 32 oz Ground Sausage -2 small packages
- 30 oz Frozen Shredded potatoes
- 12 eggs

- 2 Cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 can biscuit dough or homemade biscuit mix
- salt and pepper to taste



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. While the coals are heating up place the dutch oven over then and cook the sausage until browned.
- 2. Remove from heat and pour the package of hashbrowns over it.
- 3. Then crack the 12 eggs over the potato layer as evenly as possible.

- 5. Then place the biscuits all over the cheese or homemade biscuit mix.
- 6. Cover the dutch oven and then add coals on the top and bottom of dutch oven.

Ride Local Big Stump and trail to Ella Falls



Big Stump and Ella Falls is located in Kings Canyon National Park. This ride is well worth your time to travel to the park. It is 64 miles to the parking lot from the west side of Fresno. There is a toll to get into the park unless you have a pass.

Despite being right next to the main Kings Canyon National Park entrance on Highway 180, most people drive past the giant sequoia of Big Stump Basin without stopping. Most people are focused on famous trees at the General Grant Grove, 3 miles further down the road. So the trail through the basin is less crowded. It has a greater variety of things to see, including old growth sequoia, grassy meadows, wildflowers, and in particular many huge stumps resulting from logging of the original forest in the late nineteenth century. It can be very busy so I recommend getting there early in the morning before the crowd.

After riding through the Big Stump area which is only around 2 miles of trails. It is really beautiful in the area and everyone needs to see the Mark Twain Tree. They made steps so you can walk up on the stump. NOT WITH YOUR EQUINE. After spending time you can cross the parking lot and head down the bank to the tunnel that crosses the street, They DO NOT want you to cross the street due to the two curves and high level of traffic. Very dangerous. Use tunnel. We didn't go through the tunnel due to size of our mules. Right at the entrance to the tunnel you will see signs that direct

you to other trails. You can pick up all these trails by heading out on the marked trail.



You can zig zag all over the area. Most of the trails are pretty well marked. But carrying a map would be a benefit. You can pick up a map at the gate entrance which will show all the trails. We thought both sides of the trail was not safe for our equine. It could be done if you wanted to take the chance. So we turned around and headed back to the parking lot. 

WILLIES CREEK SLOT CANYON

Part Two




As we continue our coverage of the trip to Bryce Canyon here is our second ride at Willies Creek Slot Canyon This ride was only about a 15 minute drive or less from Bryce Valley Ranch RV and Horse Park. We rented a trailer from the park and got some great directions and instructions from the employees. One of the main issues was to make sure you had four wheel drive and that you weren't afraid to put the pedal to the metal when climbing the first big hill on the side road to the slots. The road was sandy and you had to make sure know one was coming down as you headed up. The next was to make sure you parked at the horse corals and not to block any entrance to the chutes. Corrals don't look like much but are still in use by local ranchers. The first part of the ride is down a road until you reach the river bed. Very little water if any at this time. As we rode up the river it was very scenic and the canyon seemed to start growing on both sides. The ride was about 9.5 miles out and back. As you ride up the canyon and you come to a branch that goes left and right. Up to this point it was kind of like just a ride in a river bed with high canyon on both sides and plenty of space. After taking the right branch the canyon and scenery began to change. Yes the canyon walls where getting closer and seemed to be much higher. At this

point I was asking myself where are the slots and it was not like people had explained. But within a few hundred yards the walls became closer and now we are in the slots. You definitely wouldn't want to get caught in there if there was a large rain fall or flash flood which can appear. The pictures below will show how the canyon progresses from open space to very tight quarters. There were spots in the slots that you would not be able to pass another equine. The ride is a great ride and most people enjoy it so much that they do it several times during their stay in the area. Hope you enjoy the pictures. You just have to be in the slots to really understand and enjoy. The next article will be Thunder Mountain. This ride is one that you need to Cowboy/Cowgirl up to ride.







Lake Thomas A. Edison Work Party

On the 24th of June we all met up on Kaiser Pass Road at the pull out for Badger Flat Campground to pass out radios and meet up with Muriel Holland our Pilot car driver for the trip into Lake Thomas A. Edison. Before we departed Joe & Carol are Stuck with a truck that wont start. It is decided to send the rest of us in with Phil taking the pilot car position, and Joe & Carol waiting for a vehicle change out and coming in later that day. We were hosted again this year by the High Sierra Pack Station and got into the station and got our Rigs parked for the week and our stock settled in. Jennifer Best came in after us as she was working down at Mono Hot Springs. Joe & Carol made it in late in the afternoon and everybody got busy moving food and supplies for the week into the cook house. The next morning, we went over the JHA's, checked all the chain saws, and tacked up our stock and separated into two teams. Our team of Jim Knabke, Jennifer Best, Doug Laber, and I headed out and worked the Lake Trail to the first campsite. We then came back to the Goodale Pass trail and cleared that to the Wilderness, then cleared the Devils Bathtub Trail to the wilderness. Bob Skinner, Carol Kaminski, and Phil Mirise were on the other team along with forest service personal and cleared the lake trail of buck brush/ white thorn and small trees from center of trail out 4' both sides for about 1.75 miles. The next day after breakfast we all met for the daily JHA's and again split up into same two groups. We would be helping Micky and Gary (Forest Service Volunteers) on the Goodale Pass trail above the wilderness clearing trail. Doug and I were packing in their gear and would be taking it up to the landing just below Cold Creek as they would be overnighting a few days in the wilderness clearing trail. Above the wilderness line this area of the forest was torched. We worked the trail with Mickey and Gary using the buck saw and silky saws and then we hit a big tree in the trail, and it was decided that we would go ahead and spot their equipment up by Cold Creek. The Other team went all the way to the causeways on the lake trail and cleared that part of the lake trail. The next day the two teams combined to work the pack station shortcut trail and it took the whole team the whole day to get half of it done. The next day after breakfast we changed the teams a bit with Doug and I going up to pick up Mickey and Gary's gear and help them with a big snag on our way back to the station. The rest of our crew finished the work on the shortcut trail that day. Wednesday


was a free day and Doug and I wanted to finally make the ride to Devils Bathtub, and we did just that. It was worth the trip to see and enjoyed cleared trails getting there and back. For the week both teams cleared over 77 trees 4"-40" along with various smaller tree from the trail making 133 cuts with either chain saw, buck saw, silky saws, and or loppers.



For that reason your unit board of directors has made this shirt availble for safety on trail rides and work parties as well as a way to promote our unit and its activities.

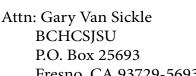

Objectives & Purpose of the Backcountry Horseman of California From the BCHC Bylaws

- To improve and promote the use, care and development of California backcountry trails, campsites, streams and meadows; to advocate good trail manners.
- To promote the conservation and utilization of our backcountry resources in concert with livestock transportation.
- To keep the backcountry trails and forage areas open to horseman on all public lands.
- To keep current information before the Corporation membership and its local Units regarding new legis-lation or management plans related to government regulations of the backcountry.
- To support or oppose new proposals, plans and restrictions as related to the interest of horsemen and those persons interested in recreational stock use and enjoying the backcountry.
- To promote the interest of people who, due to health or physical factors, need transportation other than by foot on backcountry trails.
- To promote public awareness and interest in the historical aspect of horsemen and stock in the back-country and to help educate backcountry users on the ways to use the trail and foraged in a manner that conserves the backcountry resources.
